

T2G LEADERSHIP RETREAT.

Teach2Give (T2G) will host a Leadership Conference in January 2024 to increase our mentoring capacity. We are currently in four (4) universities. T2G currently has 50 cohort students enrolled for the first semester in 2024. Our goal is to mentor well over 100 cohort students by the end of the year. Thus, we need 25 mentors in January working toward 50 by the end of the year.

During this two-day conference, we will help 20 selected mentees to understand the T2G mission aligned with their own goals in life. We will also cover the basics of mentoring and a suggested 12-week mentoring guide. There will be numerous case studies and role play exercises to help these mentees to reverse roles as they become mentors. The conference will be held at the beautiful Aberdare Country Lodge, pictured below, located on the edge of the Aberdare National Park and is sure to be an ideal setting.

This conference fits into the larger goal of raising up Kenyan leaders. The mentoring opportunity will help these rising leaders to develop strong listening skills, questioning skills and influencing skills. We hope to offer such opportunities annually.
